## Calling All College Students

College students don't forget to request your absentee ballot from your town clerk's office well in advance of the November 4th general election day. Why? Because it takes time to turn the absentee ballot process around. You request the ballot, then the clerk needs time to send a ballot, then the student needs to vote the ballot, sign the affidavit envelope accompanying the ballot (critical because otherwise the ballot cannot be counted), and return it to the town clerk all before 5:00pm November 3rd if delivered by hand and by 5:00pm on November 4th, election day if mailed.

This year's election is critical on many levels. It is important that all eligible American citizens exercise their precious right to vote but your generation has had a tendency to stay on the sidelines in year's past. NOT THIS YEAR! YOU need to weigh in. Many decisions have been made over the last 8 years which will affect your generation for year's to come and some of those decisions have not left your generation with a pretty picture (a trillion \$ treasury deficit which eliminates your generation's ability to do things which help America function for all citizens). While you have the option of voting in the jurisdiction of your college (check with the local town clerk to verify this) we have very important and hotly contested elections taking place in New Hampshire for US Senate and US Congressional Representatives, local state representatives, and executive council. If you want to vote in your hometown via absentee ballot because you will be absent from your hometown on Election Day you can do the fol-

## The System is Substandard

#### To the editor:

The reason ACA has been asking questions about the decision to start an Amherst only dispatch center is simple. The original argument was that it would be cheaper for Amherst to go it alone. Our Town Administrator, the Board of Selectmen and several Department heads at the time insisted the town could dispatch itself at a first year savings of \$30,000.00. We asked questions about the finances and no answers were forthcoming. We had solid information that was leading us to believe it was not cheaper and we were told we were wrong. We got our own estimate from MACC base on what it would cost for Amherst to still be part of the regional dispatch center. They calculated the cost to be \$190,000.00. We were, at the time, looking at a proposed Amherst Communication Center budget for 2006 of \$269,000.00. We asked more questions and again we got no answers. The Amherst Communication Center budget for 2008 is over \$350,000.00.

Since 2004 the Amherst Communication Center budget has more than doubled. In 2004 the budget was \$164,996.09 in 2008 it is \$353,457.09. We would like to know when or if, that trend will stop. We are still paying more

The Police Department budget was reduced because there were some part time people who wouldn't be needed anymore, but the people never disappeared. The numbers didn't work then and they are even further off now.

The real issue was control and nothing but control. The result is that the town of Amherst walked away from a cost effective, efficient regional dispatch center that was providing excellent service to Amherst and several other communities. They walked away from a system into which the taxpayers of Amherst had invested tens of thousands of dollars. Over many years, this investment was needed to both improve upon and maintain a high level of service. We have now lost that investment and received a lower level of service at a higher annual cost.

They walked away from the Milford Area Communication Center knowing that they didn't have the infrastructure (antenna system) that was needed to provide service throughout the town of Amherst.

When one of our own ACA members needed an ambulance at their home for a medical emergency, the EMT's had to use the phone in their kitchen because they couldn't reach the Amherst dispatch center by radio.

We are not knocking the dispatchers at the Amherst Communication Center. They do the best they can with the system that they have to work

It is the system that is substandard. It will cost thousands more of our tax dollars and take a few more years before the level of service that we had at MACC base is equaled here in Amherst.

This is just another example of appointed and elected officials doing whatever it takes to get what they want regardless of the affect on the folks who are picking up the tab.

#### To the editor:




