## New Hampshire Philharmonic Opens Season With Music of Mozart

MANCHESTER - A renowned soloist from the Vermont Symphony Orchestra joins the New Hampshire Philharmonic for its concert on Oct 25th, featuring music of Mozart. The concert at the Palace Theatre opens the 104th season of the Philharmonic.

To open its hundred-and-fourth season, the New Hampshire Philharmonic welcomes Vermont Symphony Orchestra principal flutist Albert Brouwer to the stage. The esteemed flutist joins forces with the Philharmonic to present Mozart's Concerto in G for flute and orchestra. This charming solo shows off the lyricism and joy so typical of the music of Mozart.

The soloist is a rising star on the classical stage. Flutist Albert Brouwer is the principal flutist of the Vermont Symphony Orchestra and the Springfield Symphony Orchestra. Mr. Brouwer is featured frequently in solo works with both orchestras; recent performances include concertos of Liebermann, Khachaturian and Vivaldi, and the Bach Brandenburg concertos with the world-renowned Jaime Laredo on violin.

Now living in Quebec, Albert Brouwer is originally from the Netherlands, where he graduated with great distinction from the Utrecht Conservatory of Music while studying with Abbie de Quant. Mr. Brouwer was formerly a member of the Schleswig-Holstein Festival in Germany, where he played under the baton of conductors such as Georg Solti, Lorin Maazel, Mstislav Rostropovich and Valery Gergiev.

Returning to lead the orchestra for its 104th season is long-time Music Director Anthony Princiotti, who is in his ninth year with the Philharmonic. Princiotti is a graduate of Juilliard, Tanglewood and Yale, and studied conducting with both Leonard Bernstein and Seiji

Reached at his home in Walpole, Mr. Princiotti commented on the musical choices that he made for the upcoming performance. "This program opens our season with music that is at once welcoming and stimulating. The Mozart Flute Concerto is an extremely engaging piece that embodies all the qualities of ingenuity and creativity that make Mozart's music so appealing. Having the opportunity to perform this work with Albert Brouwer, a friend and colleague whose playing ranks him among the finest young flutists of our time, will be

The concert includes a performance of Dvorak's Symphony 6. "The Dvorak is a piece that is, in my opinion, performed too infrequently. It is the symphony in which Dvorak really hits his stride as a symphonic composer for the first time, making it a worthy companion to his more famous 7th, 8th and 9th Symphonies. One of the many aspects of this piece that I love are the many echoes of Brahms' 2nd Symphony in it; there are all sorts of moments in the music that sound like Brahms that has been put through a filter of Czech folksiness and lightness".

Music Director Anthony Princiotti leads the Philharmonic in concert on Saturday, October 25 (8 pm) at the Palace Theatre, Manchester. Tickets are available through the Palace box office at 668-5588. Directed by Tajoura Davis who acted in the 2007 reading of the script, After Denmark concerns a mixed race man who learns that he might be a decent of the famous freed slave Denmark Vesey and goes on an odyssey to learn the truth of his identity. Other actors performing in this play include Lindsay Duso of Washington, DC, Maria Mendes and Teddy Hendricks of Rhode Island and Marc Pelletier of New Hampshire.

Those are just four of the 25 artists whose works will be featured in a group show that highlights the best New Hampshire has to offer in the way of visual and media arts. The exhibit, opening Oct. 3 at the Sharon Arts Center Exhibition Gallery, brings together for the first time work by visual artists who have received fellowships from the New Hampshire State Council on the Arts during the last decade.

"A Gathering of New Hampshire Visual Arts Fellows: 1999-2009" will be showing in the Sharon Arts Exhibition Gallery in downtown Peterborough from Oct. 3 through Nov. 29. The artists work in a wide variety of mediums, including painting, photography, sculpture, ceramics, installation art and film.

Individual Artist Fellows have been selected annually by the New Hampshire State Council on the Arts since 1981. They represent the range of artists living and working in New Hampshire who have a proven professional commitment and produce works of high artistic quality, as judged by a panel of their peers from anonymous applications. Fellowships are awarded in three categories, Visual and Media Arts, Performing Arts, and Literature, and are highly competitive; usually only two artists are chosen in each category each year from more than a hundred applicants. Fellowships provide recipients with funding and opportunities to further their artistic careers.


