My daughter Kerry's father-in-law was a producer at NBC and is a friend of Tom Brokaw. We had invited Tom to Kerry's wedding, but he was unable to come, much to my sister's chagrin, because she had wanted to bounce in the bouncey-castle with him that day! Anyway, when he heard that "Peggy of Amherst, NH" had asked a question, Marc Kusnetz texted Tom Brokaw, and he replied right away, saying that "they loved that question." Tom Brokaw loved my question—wahoo!






