The annual performance boasts a cast of international guest artists including Carlos Molina, principal dancer with Boston Ballet.

We are so thrilled to have Carlos Molina performing the role of Cavalier this year," stated Patricia Lavoie, artistic director for Southern NH Dance Theater. "He will be a very welcome addition to our cast," added Lavoie. Carlos Molina, originally from Colombia, has been a principal dancer with Hartford Ballet and a soloist with American Ballet Theatre. In 2004, Molina joined Boston Ballet as a principal dancer. He has performed many principal dance roles including ballets choreographed by George Balanchine, Agnes de Mille, Marius Petipa and Antony Tudor. The production also includes several professional dancers from various parts of the globe, including William Agliata, Benjamin Briones, Bafana Solomon Matea, and Richard Yé. William Agliata, originally from Italy, is an accomplished artist who worked as a dancer, baritone opera singer, and choreographer in Italy before coming to the U.S. He has danced in Otello with the Metropolitan Opera and with Rebecca Kelly Ballet in New York. Mr. Agliata also played a principal role in Little Manhattan by 20th Century Fox. Benjamin Briones, from Mexico originally, has danced with several professional companies in-cluding Ballet Austin and New Haven Ballet and is currently choreographer for Ajkun Ballet Theatre in NYC and is Ballet Master and Resident Choreographer with Staten Island Ballet. Bafana Solomon Matea, born in Pretoria, South Africa, studied under scholarship at the Alvin Ailey Dance School and is a founding member and artist of JUSTAPOWER, a unique African theater-dance production based in New York City. Richard Yé, American-born, has performed with numerous dance companies throughout the U.S. including seasons with the Milwaukee Ballet, Cincinnati Ballet and the Metropolitan Opera at Lincoln Center in New York City and on tour in Japan.

Southern NH Dance Theater is also pleased to have two local professionals return to the production. Douglas Davis, will dance the role of Drosselmeyer in Act I. Mr. Davis has danced professionally in both the U.S. and Europe with the Los Angeles Ballet, the Frankfurt Ballet, Zurich Ballet and Bern Ballet. Sallie Werst of Merrimack will perform the roles of Spanish Soloist and Arabian Soloist. A former dancer and alumni of Southern NH Dance Theater, Ms. Werst has danced with Bossov Ballet Theater, Vermont Chamber Ballet and the Central Pennsylvania Youth Ballet.

She also studied in New York City at Ballet Academy East with Darla Hoover and several renowned choreographers. Mr. Davis and Ms. Werst are both currently on faculty

These distinguished guest artists are a great compliment to the many wonderful and talented local dancers from southern NH that represent SNHDT's performing company. The part of the beautiful Sugar Plum Fairy will be danced by three beautiful dancers: Aubrey Pearson of Merrimack, Lauren Shepard of Litchfield, and Elisabeth Wilson of Mont Vernon. The brave young character central to the entire story, Clara, will be performed this year by both Kayley Lyttle of Milford and Kristen Chester of Amherst.

Early 20th-Century Photographs on View at the New Hampshire Historical Society

CONCORD — Ralph C. Larrabee (1870-1935) of Boston was one of a group of grass-roots conservationists who helped open the natural landscape to a new generation of Americans during the early 20th century. As two-time president of the Appalachian Mountain Club, longtime chairman of its guidebook committee, active trail builder, and avid amateur photographer, Larrabee and his work helped to inspire new ways of thinking about and using the natural environment.

Through the cooperative efforts of the Larrabee family and the Appalachian Mountain Club, the New Hampshire Historical Society has acquired more than 5,000 of Larrabee's black and white photographic negatives and prints. An exhibition of Larrabee's work, On the Trail: The Photographs of Ralph C. Larrabee and the Appalachian Mountain Club, is on view at the Society's library in Concord through June 21, 2009. Admission to the exhibition

The early 20th century was a time of great social, economic, and cultural change in America. The landscape of northern New England was also changing rapidly as populations expanded and industries grew. Ralph Larrabee captured the natural beauty of this landscape on film as he cleared trails, built camps, and explored the mountains. On the Trail: The Photographs of Ralph C. Larrabee and the Appalachian Mountain Club explores ideas about the importance of the natural landscape through 90 photographs, early cameras and hiking equipment, maps, and books owned and used by Larrabee and his contem-

The first section of the exhibition sets the stage for the story of the relationship between White Mountain photography and making the landscape accessible, by exploring the popularization of photography as an American middle class ac-

tivity during the late 19th century. The second section examines the growing importance of the natural landscape as a symbol of ideals and values in a changing American culture. The third section looks at how the rising spirit of progressivism became a vehicle for identification and preservation of the natural landscape in a changing world during the early 20th century. Finally, visitors see how Ralph Larrabee and other Americans used photography and the nature-based activities of the Appalachian Mountain Club to make the natural landscape more accessible to people.
