#### Recyclable Items on the "Hill"

- Aluminum beverage cans (please no dog or cat food, no aluminum foil)
- Corrugated cardboard (flattened, clean, dry, unwaxed), brown paper bags. No pizza boxes!
- Newsprint and inserts. Catalogs, hardbound, paperbacks, phone books ALL WITHOUT COVERS.
- Comingles - steel cans, plastic food, drink and detergent containers (#1-7), milk and juice containers (plastic and coated cardboard). No ceramics, motor oil containers.
- Glass (all colors) bottles and jars. No window glass, light bulbs.

#### Sofa Beds

Please remove the metal bed frame from sofa prior to arrival.

#### Textile

Clothing, shoes, sheets, curtains, stuffed animals, towels, & leather goods. - Clean and dry PLEASE, NO soiled materials, rugs, pillows, socks, or underwear.

#### Yard Waste

- Leaves and grass clippings are stockpiled beyond the scale house. Employees turn the compost pile and once per year the material is shredded to make composted loam. To recover the cost of processing, composted loam is made available for \$10/ton (\$2.00 minimum charge).
- Brush and logs are stockpiled on the upper level to the right. Logs 6 inches and over must go across the scale with an assessment of \$0.10 per pound. Mixed loads are figured at the discretion of the weigh master. Once per year, logs and brush are chipped/shredded and marketed. Please, clean unpainted, untreated, non- stained, wood only.
- Do Not dispose of yard waste in your trash: it will pollute a load & cause it to be rejected creating additional and unnecessary costs!

#### Waste Oil

Is collected in a self-contained trailer on the hill in the middle of the circular driveway. Used motor oil, fifty weight and below, is transported by town employees and used to heat the Public Works garage.

#### Antifreeze

We now have a 275 gallon drum with secondary containment to collect antifreeze located near the waste oil trailer.

#### Appliances and Scrap Metals

At the top of the hill, scrap aluminum, brass, copper, steel, cast iron, light metals, appliances (free of fluids and residue), metal frames from sofa beds.

#### Automotive Batteries

- At the top of the hill in the small shed created for that purpose.

#### Still Good Shed

- Games, household items, toys, sporting goods, and manageable furniture (see attendant first). The volume of items deposited often gets out of hand and after a period of time the building is cleared.

#### Book Swap

- Book swap room is located in the red building on the left

ACCEPTABLE Mixed Paper Recycling Junk Mail Envelopes (even those with windows) Cereal Boxes, Shoe Boxes, etc. (aka chipboard) Computer Paper Paper Egg Cartons (styrofoam type goes in trash) Manila Envelopes, Office Paper, Posters, School Paper (e.g., ruled, construction) Soft Cover Books, Telephone Books, White or Colored Paper, Hard Cover Books (with covers removed)

## Obituary

### Elizabeth Richardson Miles

Enjoyed knitting, cooking, playing piano



Elizabeth Richardson Miles, 92, of Milford, died December 29, 2008 in Nashua. Born in Amherst, in Ponemah, on her family farm on July 21, 1916, she was a fifth child of seven, whose parents were Arthur Charles Richardson and Lizzie Boutelle Mackay Richardson of Ponemah.

She was predeceased by her husband of 60 years, Hibbert Vaughn Miles, and a daughter, Mary Lu Miles Chamberlain.

As a resident of Granite Square in Milford, Libby was known as a friendly, giving and loving friend to many. She loved to knit, play the piano and cook. In days past, she and her husband enjoyed carving and painting wooden duck decoys.

Elizabeth attended Amherst schools and was a graduate of Milford High School in 1934. She also was a member of the Milford Girls Basketball State Championship squad. Following her graduation from Bryant Stratton College in Providence, R.I. in 1936, she worked for Judge Prescott in Milford for a number of years, then for the Hillborough County Extension Services.

Libby was a seventh generation descendant of her family who helped settle New England and was a loyal and diligent keeper of the family's historical records. During her life, she was a member of the Eastern Star and Amherst Legion Auxiliary.

She is survived by two sisters, Helen Richardson Lee of Lawrenceville, Ga.

and Barbara Richardson Baxter of Lisbon, N.Y. Elizabeth was predeceased by two sisters, Alma Richardson Weissner of Concord and Marion Richardson Hanlon of Milford, and two brothers, John Richardson of Milford and David Richardson of Amherst.

She is survived by two daughters, Brenda Miles Perry and her husband, Robert W. Perry, and daughter, Jo Anne Miles Estey and her husband, K. Barry Esty, along with seven grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Burial will take place in the spring with graveside services at Meadowview Cemetery in Amherst. Memorial contributions may be made in her name to the Souhegan Nursing Association, North River Road, Milford.
