Robins are not used to eating at bird feeders so don't expect to attract them to your feeder with raisins or berries. It would not occur to robins to look to humans to supply them with food. If you are interested in feeding the robins, start this summer by planting a winter fruit garden! Other natural foods that robins eat this time of year are bittersweet, bayberry, and mountain ash, sumac and snowberries. They are heavy water drinkers however and are very familiar with bird baths. A heated bird bath will attract many robins at a time and they seem to hang out on the lip for a long time, warming their feet.

Other birds attracted to the crab apple trees each year are flocks of Cedar Waxwings. You may catch a

glimpse of the bright yellow dip on the end of their tails as they fly from the crab apple trees to the tall pines or maple trees the next street over. They are a bit smaller than the robin with a crest and defining black mask. With all this surplus of birds the hawks that snatch birds out of midair are also prevalent. The Coopers Hawk, Sharp-shinned Hawk and American Kestrel are all hanging out in the trees around the village and make quite a dent in the population of these winter flocks. By January most of the flocks have moved on and those of us who live in the village and watch this event each year, know it is time to head out to the car wash to get the red berry poop off our cars until next year.

With Mr. Galinson questioning whether a \$15 million bond would pass, Mr. Bowler said this is "a shot we have to take."

Ways and Means chair Deirdre Rogusky said that in her opinion a single bond for \$15 million was the logical way to go.

Ways and Means member Bob Petrella said he did not support the bond and was sure it wouldn't pass. Ways and Means member Chris Nowlan supports the bond and said

it needed to be sold as a \$300 per year bill per home investment in the future.

Bowler said it was the Selectmen's job to sell this with the idea if it didn't pass this year, it can come back again next year.

Also on the warrant will be an article for the purchase of cardiac defibrillation and resuscitation equipment, DPW replacement truck, Fire Department capital reserve fund, and Health and Human Service agencies.

The town operating budget has a 3.6% increase.

The public hearing on the town's bonds and budget will be held on Town Hall. And the Deliberative Session is scheduled for Wednesday, February 4 at 7:00 p.m. at SHS.

meetings. Complete coverage and discussion of the goals is more important than finishing according to a schedule that has now been shown to be too short.

Historic and Cultural Resourc-

The Historic and Cultural Resources goals are (1) to preserve town character, including rural landscapes, and historic and cultural resources throughout town, (2) to protect historic and cultural resources in the village, and (3) to encourage cultural activities. Among the possible actions suggested to achieve these goals are the development and expansion of inventories of historic and cultural resources, possible zoning changes, and a number of possible changes in the village.

Natural Resources

Our Natural Resources goals are (1) to protect natural resources, (2) to preserve a diversity of habitats, and (3) to protect water resourcachieve these goals are the creation of a town-wide trail network, the protection of important views and viewsheds, the protection of corridors between protected areas, and to choose development that does not compromise water quality.

Housing

The Housing goals are (1) preserve the town's character, (2) encourage a diversity of housing, and (3) control the fiscal impacts of development. Among the suggested actions to meet housing goals are to create an Amherst Housing Committee, to encourage smaller units on smaller lots, to consider the use of common septic systems, and to allow some clustering and condominium development in town.

Additional details about these goals and the actions needed to accomplish them can be found in the documents at the Master Plan website. The document "Amherst Master Plan Vision and Goals" attempts to prioritize actions and identifies responsible groups for those actions. Now is the time to carefully review the town's goals and assure that we have them right. 




