St. Petersburg String Quartet

World Renowned Chamber Ensemble from Russia

MANCHESTER – The Dana Center for the Humanities, regional performing arts center at Saint Anselm College continues the tradition of bringing the world's greatest international performing artists to New Hampshire by presenting the St. Petersburg String Quartet for one evening performance only on Thursday, February 19, at 7p.m.

Since moving to the United States in 1997, the world-renowned chamber ensemble from Russia has blazed an impressively Olympic trail through international chamber music competitions, taking home Silver and Gold in Tokyo, Italy and Australia over the years. Combining the power and emotionalism of the great American quartets with European style, precision and attention to detail, their luxuriously dark rich

tone is music-making of the highest order – not to mention intoxicating. With pure passion and unparalleled technique they play the works of the greatest classical composers on earth – including Shostakovich, Ravel, Debussy, Tchaikovsky and Brahms, showing a remarkable unity of spirit in the ebb and flow of the music the world has and always will long to hear over and over again.

The quartet's rise to fame includes a Grammy nomination, "Best Record" honors in both Stereo Review and Gramophone, an opening night performance at "Mostly Mozart" in Lincoln Center, a five-year residency at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, as well as hundreds of concerts in North America, Europe and Asia.

The Washington Post hailed the ensemble's "impassioned performance...unassailable technique and intonation...an astonishingly calibrated range of voicing and dynamics...luscious tonal blend and phrasing that surged with ardor... breathtaking assurance and laughout-loud wit."

Founded in 1985 by graduates of the Leningrad Conservatory the Quartet has garnered a rather impressive list of recent concert activities, including a U.S. tour with violist Michael Tree of the Guarneri Quartet, a collaboration with Van Cliburn, Gold Medal pianist Olga Kern, and tours spanning North America, the U.K., the Netherlands,

Spain, Germany Sweden, Denmark and Israel.

In addition to the evening performance at the college, a Residency lecture and demonstration for students on campus and locals unable to attend the full program performance is scheduled to take place early in the afternoon on the same day. The residency program is part of the Dana Center's ongoing mission to broaden the scope of cultural understanding and tolerance by introducing a wide variety of cultures and artistic traditions from all over the world to the community it serves. In the process, audiences of the future are engaged and ultimately promised. An unquestionably ear-pleasing event for even the youngest member of the family, this is one concert you will not forgive vourself for missing.

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Nashua Chamber Orchestra February 21st and 22nd Concerts

NASHUA – Banish the February blues with the Nashua Chamber Orchestra's sparkling winter program, Saturday, February 21st at the Nashua Senior Center, 8:00 PM, and Sunday, February 22nd, at the Milford Town Hall 3:00 PM. PLEASE NOTE THE CHANGE OF VENUE FOR SATURDAY EVENING'S CONCERT: NASHUA SENIOR ACTIVITY CENTER, 70 TEMPLE ST. IN DOWNTOWN NASHUA.

Each concert is followed by a reception where audience members can mingle with the musicians. Tickets (\$15 adult, \$13 senior and \$8 student) are available at the door, or in advance at Darrell's Music Hall in Nashua, and Toadstool Books in Milford. The program opens with Westward Odyssey and Snake River Stomp by area composer Steve Laven, and includes the Suite Opus

4 by Richard Strauss, three spirited Hungarian Dances by Johannes Brahms, and the Symphony No. 102 in B-flat, by Franz Joseph Haydn. As always, maestro David Feltner shapes each phrase to exquisite perfection.

Steve Laven's award winning works, Westward Odyssey and Snake River Stomp, are lively, rhythmic pieces that evoke the western landscape and temperament. Westward Odyssey, inspired during a canoe trip in Minnesota, is a musical canvas of birch leaves fluttering in the wind, and shimmering water at sunset. Snake River Stomp combines elements of fiddling and folksong with a hoedown feel.

The Brahms Hungarian Dances, Numbers one, three and ten, were originally written for two pianos. These popular pieces were orchestrated by Brahms in 1873. The composer enhanced these czardas melodies to capture the colorful image of the gypsy violinist with his spirited intensity.

Written just eleven years after the Hungarian Dances, Richard Strauss' Suite Opus 4 was premiered in 1884. The Suite presents a variegated palate of woodwind colors and timbres with a range of moods from somber to playful. The rich texture creates beautiful blends while at the same time highlighting individual instruments. The lush sonorities are the hallmark of Strauss' talent and a harbinger of the tonal colors for which he is so famous in his later works.

To round out this musical soiree, we return to the Classical period with Franz Joseph Haydn's (1732—1809) Symphony No. 102 in Bb Major (1794), one of the "Lon-

don" symphonies. The son of a poor wheelwright, Haydn was a prodigiously talented and prolific composer. To listen to Haydn is to marvel at his genius. Catchy tunes populate this symphony, a masterpiece of organic form and thematic unity, with germinal ideas at the core of every movement. His fertile mind was constantly in motion,

churning out a plethora of musical ideas. His themes are like characters in a novel, and the joyful task of the listener is to recognize them in their multiple disguises: lots of "AHA!" moments here! Although this symphony lasts only about 25 minutes, chances are the tunes will be swirling in your head long after you exit the concert hall.

JoAnne Mead (soprano) will perform in Rain in Summer. Adjunct faculty member Rebecca Krause-Hardie and guest artists Jean Jeffries, Christine Mortensen, and Margot Rowlands will play Sonata for Four French Horns by Paul Hindemith and Fripperies by Low-

ell Shaw. The Monadnock Trio (Joy Flemming, bassoon; Sussan Henkel, oboe; and KSC artist-in-residence George Loring, piano) will perform a piano trio by Mozart.

Flemming is a founding member of Festival Chamber Music and principal bassoonist with the Keene Chamber Orchestra and Raylynmor Opera Orchestra.

Henkel has been a member of the KSC faculty for more than 16 years and performs regularly with the Keene Chamber Orchestra, Raylynmor Opera Company, and other New England musical groups.

Jeffries teaches horn and coaches chamber music at Amherst and Mt. Holyoke colleges and plays frequently at four of the five colleges in Western Mass.

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Krause-Hardie teaches horn at Keene State and performs throughout the New England area. Loring is an artist-in-residence at

Keene State, where he teaches piano performance, accompanying, piano pedagogy, class piano, piano ensemble, and music theory.

Mead is well known locally as a soprano soloist, vocal instructor, and music director.

Mortensen teaches French horn and is a freelance performer in Western Massachusetts, southern Vermont, and New Hampshire

Pardus is professor emeritus of music and former chairman of the Music Department at Keene State.

Rowland teaches and plays horn and has been on the faculties of Longmeadow Public Schools, Westfield State College, Holyoke Community College, and University of Mass.
