CASA of New Hampshire Celebrates 20 Years of Service to NH Children

MANCHESTER -- Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of NH has been a child's voice in New Hampshire Courts for 20 years. But many people still may not know of the impact this organization has on the State. During the past 20 years, this NH statewide non-profit has trained over 1500 volunteers who have served nearly 7000 children in over 4000 court cases involving child abuse and ne-

CASA Volunteers work as an official part of the judicial proceedings alongside attorneys and social workers. Today, CASA of NH serves about 1,000 children on any given day. Unfortunately, the organization must turn down approximately 25% of the cases brought to court because of a lack of available volunteers. A CASA volunteer represents a child's best interests in Court, as that child confronts the abundance of people - judges, lawyers, social workers, therapists, foster parents,

police - involved in their case.

For 20 years, CASA of New Hampshire has been continually recruiting, training and supervising volunteers to serve as advocates for abused and neglected children during the time when the cases are before the court.

"The volunteers that we've met over the years are truly the strength and unsung heroes of the organization," said Marty Sink, CEO of CASA of NH. "They tirelessly work to serve the best interest of abused and neglected children and they do it confidentially, in the Family Courts, where the pubic doesn't see their impact."

But judges and court workers have become fully aware of the value of this volunteer army of everyday people who share a concern for children.


