Trombi Recognized for Achievements at WPI

The WPI Athletic Department, Poly Club, and Hall of Fame Selection Committee recently welcomed its 27th induction class. The five newest members were inducted on Friday, October 30 as part of Homecoming Weekend and included Amherst resident Garrett Trombi

'95 - Wrestling.

In the history of WPI Wrestling, 30 athletes have won a total of 37 New England championships. Only one has earned the "Tournament Most Outstanding Wrestler" award--Garrett Trombi.

Trombi began to establish himself among the top wrestlers in New England as a sophomore. He racked up 50 team points while posting a 10-1-1 mark in dual meets. He earned his first of three All-New England medals at the championships when he placed fourth at 150

After missing a season due to injury, Trombi returned to the mat for his junior campaign in 1993-94. He picked up right where he left off, winning nine of 10 decisions dur-

ing the dual meet season. His success pushed the Crimson and Gray to a 13-3 dual meet record that winter, helping the Engineers earn their third NECCWA team championship by finishing second at 150 pounds at the championships.

During his senior season, Trombi was a man possessed. He won 14 dual matches, including three by pin. He simply dominated the competition at the NECCWA championship, taking home the title at 150 pounds and in the process becoming the only wrestler in WPI history to be named Tournament Most Outstanding Wrestler. The Engineers used every point Trombi amassed at the championships to split the team championship title with Williams.

Unfortunately, a serious injury between the New England's and the NCAA Championships didn't give him an opportunity to compete for

a national championship.

"If it weren't for his untimely injury the Sunday prior to the NCAAs, Garrett almost certainly would have placed very high at the national championships," remarked his assistant coach, Hall of Famer Paul Wyman.

Trombi left his mark on the WPI record book, particularly in the takedown category. Three times he cracked the top five in single-season takedowns, including the second most (71) during his junior season. His career total of 215 takedowns are an eye-popping 60 more than the next highest mark in program history. He ended his career with an impressive 41-9-1 record with six wins by pin.

"Garrett's four-year varsity wrestling career can be described as intense, driven and exemplary," said Hall of Fame head coach Phil Grebinar. "A team leader both in practice and in competitions, Garrett always worked for excellence in both his own performance and the teams. As co-captain on two New England championship winning teams, Garrett's leadership was instrumental in that success.

Garrett Trombi, graduated with honors from WPI in 1995 with a degree in civil engineering. He is a graduate of MASH class of 1989.

He now works in sales for Barker Steel, a rebar fabricator. He and his wife, Kathy, live in their hometown of Amherst with their children, Paul and Caroline.

The Derryfield School:

A Novice on the Crew Team

MANCHESTER - If you're not keen on ball sports but your school requires that you join an athletic team, what sport do you choose? Freshman Meg Huckaby of Amherst, a dancer who loves the water, chose "crew." It's a great sport for novices, because most of the kids get to high school with no prior rowing experience. There are no try-outs; no one gets eliminated from the team.

New to The Derryfield School this year, Meg felt really welcomed by this team. The one-week retreat at a camp on a lake in Vermont before school started was a great bonding and learning experience. "Crew is really hard to pick up at first, and everything you do affects another person, so you're proud of yourself when you get it," said Meg.

The novices competed in two regattas during their first season. Meg loved the motivation of rowing for the team and working to achieve effective unison with her crews. At the NH Championships regatta held on

the Merrimack River in Hooksett and Pembroke on Oct. 10, she competed in a Novice 4 race (pictured), and also a Junior 8 race where the crew was comprised of six JV and two novice rowers plus the cox'n. (In crew lingo, "junior" means high school, to distinguish from college races at the same event.) Derryfield's team had 12 boats of boys and girls, ranging from a single to 4s and 8s, entered in the 4.8k races at

At the Head of the Fish Regatta in Saratoga, NY on Oct. 24, crews toughed out miserable weather. During a chilly downpour early in the morning, Derryfield's girls Lightweight boat launched, followed shortly by the boys First and Second (varsity) boats. As the three boats and their competitors were rowing the 2.2 miles to the starting line on Fish Creek, flashes of lightning forced all crews off the water. Derryfield boys stayed on the dock in the storm helping less experienced crews to safety. After a wait of about 90 minutes in the nearby Skidmore boathouse, during which

the athletes were checked for hypothermia, the racing resumed. Some boats dropped out, but the Derryfield Light 4 crew (each athlete 135 lbs max) – Meg, junior R. Diep (of Concord), sophomore R. Lamy (Chester), and sophomore K. Ridinger (Hopkinton) with junior Aran Hubbell (Nashua) as coxswain - opted to persevere. Meg said she was so drained at the end that Coach made her drop out of a later race; she called it an "interesting experience."

Others competed again in the rain. Derryfield had three boats of girls Junior 4s in the last race of the day. Aran "cox'ed" (steered by means of voice commands given through a microphone) the Derryfield girls First (varsity) boat to a 5th place finish out of 25. The rowers in her boat were seniors H. Monty (Bedford) and M. Kramer (Manchester), and juniors Z. Sobin (Manchester) and L. Steer (Nashua).

Souhegan High School Boys Volleyball

The seventh place Souhegan High School Boys Volleyball (4-12) concluded their season with a 3-0 loss at Timberlane on October 23rd. A season filled with higher expectations seemed to unravel after a very disheartening loss at Oyster River on 9/17. At the time the Sabers were sporting a 3-3 record and led Oyster River in all five of the games before finally loosing the match in the decisive game after leading 12-8 in a game to 15. This was just a week after loosing another tough match at home against Mascenic. Instead of

being 5-2 the record dipped to 3-4. On 10/13 the Sabers hosted Oyster River and redeemed the earlier defeat. The win doubled the total of last season, which was one of the season's goals. However, the juniors, Thom Andrews, Michael Van Sickle, Stephen Jordan, returning are doubtful with the sport moving to the spring in its next season. Sophomore David Mazerall may return
