# Support Souhegan Valley Rides, Article #43

### To the editor:

Voting "Yes" on Article #43 on March 9th will add \$1.50 to your Town of Amherst car registration fee. This will allow Amherst residents to continue being served by a low cost, door-to-door, wheel-chair-accessible bus system now available to residents of Amherst, Brookline, Hollis and Milford. The bus serves destinations within these towns and downtown Nashua for non-emergency medical and other transportation needs. About 1,500 rides have been provided by this service since its inception in October of 2008, and utilization is expected to grow 40% this year.

The knee-jerk reaction of many will be, "What? Another tax? Shouldn't some charity provide this service?" The Board of Selectmen and the Town Ways and Means Committee recommended a "no" vote. Why? Do they think Amherst residents and Amherst destinations should not be a part of this regional network?

My response is this: We don't have to look for "some charity." Our community is charitable in many ways, and should be in this. For the elderly or handicapped, those in a wheel chair or who do not drive, this bus service means independence for essential transportation needs. Aren't those who can afford to put a car on the road willing to pay \$1.50 a year to help provide a minimal level of transportation for those who do not have it? Other funding models are possible, such as paying Amnerst's snare of this service out of Town property taxes. But this vehicle-related fee seems fair and quite

# **Cemetery Trustees Ask For Your Support on March 9**

### To the editor:

On March 9, The Amherst Cemetery Trustees ask voters to approve Article 38 to authorize \$15,000.00 to be put into the Forestview Cemetery Capital Reserve Fund. The Cemetery Trustees operate under RSA 289.2 which is shown below.

RSA 289:2 Municipality to Provide. – Every municipality shall provide one or more suitable cemeteries for the interment of deceased persons within its boundaries, which shall be subject to such regulations as the municipality may establish. In the absence of regulations established by vote of the legislative body, the cemetery trustees may establish such regulations pursuant to RSA 289:7, I(a). The operation and maintenance of all cemeteries owned and maintained by the municipality shall be in the charge of the

The Cemetery Trustees estimate Meadowview Cemetery and Cricket Corner Cemetery will be filled to capacity by 2014, which is only five years away. In order to be ready for this, the Cemetery Trustees must plan now for the construction of Forest View Cemetery which will be located on the land now known as Cemetery Fields on Merrimack Road.

Currently, the Trustees have completed 60% of the planning project which was to survey the land, do a topography map and hire a landscape architect. The \$15,000.00 in the warrant article will be used to have the landscape architect develop a final design which will be put out to bid. In addition, the final plan will give the Trustees an estimated cost on the project. In order to arrange the new cemetery, the trustees must adhere to the

RSA 289:9 Use of Trust Funds - Cemetery corporations and the trust fund trustees of municipalities may take and hold funds in trust, and may apply the income of the trust to the improvement, watering, or embellishment of the cemetery, or to the care, preservation, or embellishment of any

The Cemetery Trust Fund income from 1986 to 2006 paid for cemetery maintenance out of the interest accrued in the Trust Fund. This saved the town over \$500,000.00. In 2005, the Trustees and the Board of Selectmen reviewed the town's future need for burials. They agreed that the town would need to develop Forest View Cemetery in 2014. In order to finance the layout, it was decided that the town would start paying for 67% of cemetery maintenance with 33 % still coming out of the Cemetery Trust for maintenance. This would enable the cemetery trust fund to accumulate interest income for the construction of the new cemetery. The trustees are asking for the fifteen thousand dollars to complete the design, so that work can commence on the layout plans.

The Trustees ask for your support on March 9.

# 9.8% Spending Increase. Where Do I Start?

### To the editor:

On the ballot is a \$15 million road bond but we have seen no published plan. We have a 2 page list of roads needing repair, but no information on what will happen, when it will happen or when it will be done. Oh yes, we have the Road Surface Management Plan. I've seen it. It is a list of roads and a catalog of what happens when you do things to them like ditching, chip sealing, crack sealing, etc. It does not say Mack Hill Road will be torn up, the base material taken out and replaced and the road repaved and this will happen in year 2 of the plan. Anybody who knows road building will tell you that the mud under Mack Hill will still be mud. Mack Hill will heave and crack like it always has. That's the nature of mud underpinnings.

There is also an article asking for \$2.25 million for open space, but you don't get a say in how the money is spent. Remember the Martin land? We were told the Town must purchase now because the developers were lined up to carve up this last pristine piece. We could buy it for just \$1.9 million if we hurried. When the sentiment turned against that the seller came back with an alternative \$1.3 million for the land, but hurry or we'll be forced to sell to the developers. Here we are a year later and the land is still for sale. One could point to the future home of what has become known as "The Wet Rock Elementary School." The same story was told about the desirability of this piece and the need to hurry before the developers snapped it up. On that one the voters bit and we are still stuck with the property at the intersection of 101 and Baboosic Lake Road. It has done nothing but cost

\$625,000 for the Brewster land for playing fields? The neighbor says it's a good place to fish in the spring; 4 feet of water and the horn pout are biting. Maybe we should put that money towards fixing the roads? Or maybe we should simply stop overpaying for pieces of land.

A new scale at the dump? Let's think this one through. Why a new scale? Because in the planning for the new layout someone forgot that water ran down hill where it would drain into the hole under the scale. This sounds a lot like the salt shed where someone forgot the need for site preparation and foundation before construction could begin. The scale exists to make the citizens of Amherst pay to dispose of demolition material. How about this? Anyone who applies for a building permit must show they have rented a dumpster prior to receiving the permit. Other visits are at no charge, providing the vehicle has a dump sticker. If the employees think there is abuse they can report it and a follow up visit could occur.

Where to end? I don't know. I know there are good things in the spending like the Capital Reserve funds for Fire and EMS, and I applaud them and the planning that goes into them. I also know I didn't get an extra 9.8% in my pay envelope. As one Selectman said at the beginning of this process, "I know times are tough, but the people will just have to bite the bullet on this." Great! Pass the ammunition because I'm all out.


