

Obituary

HUBERT J. WITT

Hubert "Bud" Witt, 88, a 34 year resident of Amherst, NH, died Saturday, February 13th in Libertyville, IL, surrounded by his loving family after having lived a wonderful life. Bud was born on December 18th, 1921 in New Ulm, MN. After attending Eau Claire Teacher's College in Eau Claire, WI, he joined the US Navy. During WWII, he earned his wings as a naval aviator and was assigned as a Primary Flight Instructor at the Naval Air Station, Olathe KS. There he taught young pilots the barrel roll and like acrobatics in a Stearman PT-17 biplane.

While stationed at Olathe, Bud met his beloved wife of 55 years, Edith "Elaine" Brown of Atwood,

As other men and women came home from WWII, Bud remained in the Navy, becoming a member of the Weather Recon Squadron: VPW-1, nicknamed the "Typhoon Chasers". After intense training, in 1946, he and his crew of 11 were assigned to duty in the Central Pacific. In June of that year, flying a PBY4-2 "Privateer" (B-24), they flew into a category 3 typhoon, becoming one of the first such crews ever to do so.

Shortly thereafter, Bud was decommissioned from the Navy. He and Elaine moved to Denver, CO, started their family, and he joined the Kendall Co. for whom he worked his entire career in sales. As his career progressed, Bud moved his family from coast to coast, finally ending in 1976 in Amherst where he commuted to Boston until his retirement as a National Sales Manager for the Kendall Co. in the early

In his retirement, Bud loved fishing, photography, cabinetry, taking care of his home and gardening. His red and yellow tuberous begonias, in the summer, were a neighborhood favorite. Also, he and his beloved Elaine traveled the world: they cruised to many exotic and wonder-

He was predeceased by his wife, Elaine and two sisters, Betty and Anne.

Family members include two daughters, Karen and Molly; two sons, Ed and Joe; four grandchildren, Maryanne, Ashley, Lauren and Jeremy; and his brother, Bill.

There are no visiting hours. A mass of Christian burial will be celebrated on Friday, February 19th at 10:00 am in Saint Patrick's Church, 34 Amherst Street, Milford. Burial with military honors will be held in Meadowview Cemetery, Amherst, in the spring. Street Survival Course Raises Teens Driving Skills

Jenna didn't think the rain made driving much different. She'd had her license for three weeks and had driven in the rain once during driver's ed and even took her driving test on a rainy day. Sure, it was windy and raining hard, but it was just water, right? So, as she and her best friend Lori zipped down a dark two-lane road at 10 mph over the speed limit she felt completely in control. Until she zoomed around a curve to find a big tree branch, right in her lane, halfway through the bend. Jenna gasped. She hit the brakes but the car skidded on the wet road. It spun around, slid across the road and rolled over down an embankment into some trees.

The EMTs were able to get Jenna out of the crumpled car and rushed her to the hospital where she needed 67 stitches on her face, her shattered teeth removed, and left with a neck brace and a cast on her left leg. A week later, she stood on crutches at Lori's funeral.

Young drivers and automobiles can be a deadly combination. While driver's ed and parental instruction teach teens the rules of the road, basic steering skills, and how to parallel park—the key requirements for passing the state driving test—they fall frighteningly short of teaching kids how to handle real emergencies on the road.

Simple driving errors and inexperience behind the wheel are the #1 causes of death among teens in New Hampshire and across the nation. According to the Fatality Analysis Reporting System, six teens died every month behind the wheel in New Hampshire in 2008, and that does not include more than five people every month who died as passengers in the vehicle, occupants of other vehicles or non-occupants on the road. That was 139 people, an 8 percent increase over 2007, with New Hampshire one of three states that had an increase in teen-related traffic deaths.

So how can you help your young driver learn some of the skills needed to help keep them alive behind the wheel? One option comes to

New Hampshire Motor Speedway in Loudon on April 24, the Tire Rack Street Survival course, a national program operated in association with the BMW CCA Foundation. The 1-day course teaches teens the skills they need to stay alive behind the wheel. Unlike the classroom theory and basic maneuvers of traditional driver ed programs, Street Survival improves driver competence through experiences that reflect real-world driving situations, teaching teens how to control a vehicle rather than just operate one.

Students receive a mix of classroom and hands-on-the-wheel training about handling everyday driving hazards, obstacles and emergencies. On a large, obstruction-free parking lot, wetted down for the occasion, students learn emergency braking techniques, how to control unintended skids, and how to avoid accidents entirely. They learn in their own vehicles, not specially prepared ones, so their newfound skills can be directly translated to their daily driving. Street Survival is an affordable and effective way to help ensure your son or daughter is prepared to handle driving situations that could have potentially tragic consequences. The next Street Survival course in New Hampshire takes place at New Hampshire Motor Speedway on April 24. Amherst Resident Running For Cancer Research In The Boston Marathon

BOSTON – On April 19, Matthew Monks from Amherst will be running in the 114th Boston Marathon® to help conquer cancer as a member of the Dana-Farber Marathon Challenge (DFMC) team.

Monks, along with DFMC teammates from across the United States and other countries, will run Massachusetts' historic 26.2-mile marathon route from Hopkinton to Boston with a goal to raise \$4.4 million for cancer research at Dana-Farber Cancer Institute.

By raising a minimum of \$3,250, DFMC runners are helping to fund the Claudia Adams Barr Program in Innovative Basic Cancer Research at Dana-Farber.

Since the DFMC's inception in 1990, runners on the team have raised more than \$43 million for the Barr Program. Dana-Farber trustees and Jacksonville Jaguars principal owners J. Wayne and Delores

Barr Weaver founded the Barr Program in 1987 to honor Mrs. Weaver's mother, Claudia Adams Barr, who lost her battle with cancer 30 years earlier.

In 1990, Dana-Farber was among the first charity organizations to be recognized by the Boston Athletic Association (B.A.A.). The DFMC team offers its members training guidance from Jack Fultz, the 1976 Boston Marathon men's champion, plus team training runs, extensive fundraising support, and volunteer opportunities for non-runners. DFMC runners who are not timequalified for the Boston Marathon receive an invitational entry into the race.
