MANCHESTER - The Dana Center, regional performing arts center at Saint Anselm College upholds its tradition of bringing you the most original Irish bands on the planet to celebrate Saint Patrick's Day. This year we bring a unique brew of Celtic music with two powerhouse bands from two surprising corners of the world. Pogey and Cara will be at the Dana Center for a one evening performance only on Friday, March 12, at 8p.m.

Pogey hails from Halifax, Nova Scotia, bringing with them an intoxicating blend of traditional and contemporary sound that combines original Celtic/Rock tunes with stellar instrumentals. A feast of fiddle, mandolin, acoustic guitar, banjo, bass, drums and four part vocal harmonies keeps this on the high octane stage show list for sure. For the last five years the band has been bringing audiences to their feet with all over Canada and the United States. The band's five members combine their musical talents to produce their trademark Nova Scotia Sound which they have used to provide entertainment for various performances including the Kansas City, Pittsburgh and Great American Irish Festivals. This year Pogey presents new all original recording for the CD they will be releasing in April. This Dana Center performance will give you a sneak preview of the 11 tracks that the band has been feverishly preparing for their

upcoming album. Cara calls Germany home but finds its musical roots planted firmly in Irish tradition. Weaving flute, guitar, piano, fiddle, pipes and concertina together with brilliant vocals, the band adds the flavor of German folk influence to infuse a fresh perspective on the music. The quintet plays a well-balanced mix of songs and tunes, consisting of traditional and newly composed material, most of which is written by the band members themselves. The two female lead singers are surely a hallmark of the band, but the quality standard for instrumentals and arrangements is equally high. The band's second CD "In Between Times" won them a nomination for the German Critics Awards as well as a nomination for CD of the year by "Folker" Magazine. They have

Nashua Chamber Orchestra March Nashua Symphony Chorus Program Of American Spirituals

NASHUA – On Saturday, March 20, the Nashua Symphony Chorus will present the Nashua premiere of John Rutter's Feel the Spirit as part of its "Feel the Spirit" concert. The program, which also includes a selection of works from the African-American spiritual tradition, features mezzo-soprano soloist Tania Mandzy. For this concert, which begins at 8 pm in Nashua High School North's Auditorium, Director of Choral Activities welcomes her Greater Gardner Community Choir which will join the NSC to perform Rutter's large-scale work.

Ms. Cushing comments on the program: "We are excited to sing music that celebrates life and the affirmation of a people who faced

great adversity but never lost their dignity. Spirituals serve as an inspiration for all generations; it's easy for people to understand how one can gain strength and comfort from this music. And for many people, this music leads to healing and restoration of body, mind, spirit, and

Indeed, the themes that pervade these spirituals are universal, and became the foundation for this year's cycle of the Nashua Symphony Association's "Ripple Effect" project. Poetry students at NHS North were asked to consider questions like "what does 'home' mean to you personally" and "what might it mean to yearn for a 'promised land'?" They visited the Milford Black Heritage

Trail, to get a sense of what it might have been like for people traveling the Underground Railroad in the 1850s. Passages from the students' poems were set to music by distringuished New Hampshire composer, Malcolm Hawkins; the resulting new work – The Cry for All – will be premiered by the NSC, NHS Concert Choir, and instrumentalists from the Nashua Symphony Orchestra at this concert.

Malcolm Hawkins studied in London at the Royal Academy of Music and King's College in the Strand. He worked for some years as a string bass player in the London area, and returned to the Academy as a faculty member. He received an award to study at the Mozarteum in Salzburg with composer Cesar Bresgen, and later a fellowship to study solfege and choral conducting with Peter Erdei and Ildiko Herboly at the Kodaly Institute in Hungary. He lives in Lyndeborough with his wife Charlotte (a cellist) and two daughters and a son, all of whom are string players. He directs the choir at the First Parish in Lincoln, Massachusetts.
