The Brown Universities for ty-Shenzhen Institute for Headmasters, a program that "aims to form a platform for communication between international educators to strengthen international trust, exchange and collaboration, support the pipeline of teachers and school leaders, and use research to improve policy and practice". Dan Bisaccio, a former long-time science teacher at Souhegan is now a Director of Science Education at Brown, and made the connection for the visit.

The group of 21 administrators and teachers spent a full day at Souhegan;

four members of the group served as translators. Martha Rives' advisory, students included the visitors in their game and invited questions as part of the activity. Classroom observations included an interdisciplinary economics unit, World Studies, US History, biology, engineering, and trips to the outdoors for both Conservation Biology and the High Ropes course.
