MANCHESTER – As it enters its 108th season, the New Hampshire Philharmonic has announced the appointment of a new Conductor for the coming season.

Leading the orchestra in its performances this season will be Mark Latham. Latham is a rare combination of conductor, composer, violinist and educator.

Latham replaces Anthony Princiotti, who was music director of the Philharmonic for thirteen years. Princiotti was the Philharmonic's twelfth music director, following in a renowned line that includes Rudolph Schiller in the 1920s and Rolland Tapley in the

Board President Gary Miller noted the change: "We honor Tony's legacy, and the fine work that he has done to build the orchestra's musical capabilities."

Executive Director Paul Hoffman commented on the transition. "One of the great things that Tony did during his tenure with the orchestra was to create resilience in the ensemble itself. Tony's lasting legacy will be that he encouraged the orchestra to form its own musical identity. It will be fascinating to witness how this identity will influence our new conductor, and how that identity will in turn be shaped by Mark.'

Mark Latham received his musical training at the Guildhall School (London), Philadelphia College of Performing Arts, Brooklyn College Conservatory and the University of Michigan, where he is currently a candidate for Doctor of Musical Arts in Orchestral Conducting. Latham has studied conducting with Kenneth Kiesler as well as with Marin Alsop, Gustav Meier, Larry Rachlef and Helmuth Rilling. Currently the conductor of the U Mass-Lowell Symphony and the New Hampshire Youth Symphony, Latham has led the Avalon Chamber Ensemble, the Nashua Chamber Orchestra and the Cambridge Symphony Orchestra.

As a violinist and violist he has performed in the orchestras of the New Hampshire Symphony, Vermont Symphony, Emmanuel Music, the Delaware Symphony, Cantata Singers, Orpheus and the Spoleto Festival and was a member of Canada's Atlantic String Quartet for 6 years. He trained in violin and chamber music at Eastman, Juilliard, Aspen Music Festival and Banff Festival. He has studied violin with Masao Kawasaki, Dorothy DeLay, Ithzak Perlman and Eugene Drucker.

A keen advocate of the music of our times, Latham has given numerous world premieres both as conductor and violinist.

Now in his eleventh year managing the orchestra, Hoffman had this to say about Mark Latham. "Mark brings to the table not only great musicality through his conducting skills, but, through his own work as a composer, an intimate sense of how a musical work can be breathed to life."

For its 108th season, the orchestra will present three concerts: a fall concert in October, Holiday Pops in November, and a spring concert in April. As in past seasons, the Philharmonic's concerts will take place at the Palace Theatre Manchester and the Stockbridge Theater Derry. Repertoire for the Philharmonic's 108th season will be announced during the summer.
