NH Audubon has been a leader in the monitoring and management of the state's recovering Bald Eagle population for over three decades. Currently, there are over 20 breeding pairs of Bald Eagles in New Hampshire, and the numbers are rising. On Saturday, January 12 from 8am-Noon, the Nashaway Chapter on NH Audubon will be participating in the Annual Eagle Survey. Last year, a total of 54 Bald Eagles were sited state-wide with 17 of them being spotted along the Merrimack River in Southern NH. Last year was also the first time that a Golden Eagle was discovered on the count! Wouldn't you like to try to spot an Eagle and contribute to this important data? # Widow Rachel Batchelder – A Woman Real Estate Developer in Mid-19th Century Amherst?

During the course of my research, a particular woman's name kept cropping up in deeds for various old houses in Amherst Village, someone I had never heard of: Rachel Batchelder, a widow. She appeared to make an unusually nice profit on the first property she bought, but some of her later choices seemed to make no sense: one place she owned for less than a day, another for all of ten days. Who was she and why couldn't she stay put? And where did she actually live? It's often not easy to deduce exact location from censuses, but it was clear that in 1850 and 1860 she was living in the Village, south of the Common. Then I noticed that she lived with her widowed brother - and he was a carpenter. A pattern emerged: Mrs. B. owned

most of her properties at the point when they first became dwelling houses. So I came up with an hypothesis to explain her real estate transactions: Rachel bought properties, mostly low-end, for her brother to build upon – a way to make a living for both of them. The actual builders of most of Amherst's antique houses are anonymous, meaning their names have been forgotten, even though one can identify several carpenters in local censuses of 1850 and later. In some, few cases, we can make educated guesses from circumstantial evidence (such as David Perkins Lowe for the houses labeled with his name on 1858 map). You be the judge if my guess about Timothy Jones Jr. (1798-1882) is plausible and likely! First, let me tell you a bit about our subjects.

Rachel was just 7 when her pa, Timothy Jones Sr. (1755-1793), died in Amherst at the age of 38, and her brother, Jr., was born after their pa's death. They grew up with Andrew Leavitt, a house builder, as their step-father. Rachel

was married in 1811 to Eben(ezer) Batchelder IV (1783-1815) of Mont Vernon. At 28, she was left a widow with two babies. Her brother Tim was married in 1821 and widowed in 1830, when his wife died at the age of 26, leaving him with four children ranging in age from 7 months to 7 years, of whom only two daughters survived to adulthood and married. Rachel can be found in 1820 census of Amherst with one male and one female child both under 10, and a free colored male under 14. In Feb. 1839, Rachel, of Amherst, loaned a mortgage of \$765 to Timothy, a yeoman, for a farm of 47 acres in the north part of Amherst, which he sold two months later along with a 23-acre parcel for \$1350. Perhaps this is the point he made a career change.

## 19 Middle Street

1842-1845: In Oct. 1842, widow Rachel Batchelder "of Lowell, Massachusetts" (where her married daughter lived) bought the lot

at 19 Middle Street "near the Methodist church," with its two-story bake-house, for \$400. This was Mrs. B.'s first purchase of real estate in Amherst, N.H. Three years later, she sold the property to someone from outof-state for \$1000! This substantial jump in price suggests that the place was enlarged during her ownership. It sure would make sense that Timothy Jones Jr. was the one who converted the bake-house into a dwelling house, while his sister owned the property – possibly even while the two of them were living in the original part.

## 8 Cross Street

1846-1851: In February 1846, Mrs. B. bought land on the north side of Cross Street, bounded on the west by Middle Street, for \$149.73. Ín June 1851, she sold off the irregular-shaped west corner lot with

40.5 feet of frontage (and north bound of 84 feet and an east bound of 90 feet) for \$80 plus another 15-foot strip for \$1.70, which became 8 Cross Street, to James N. Lovejoy (c.1829-1887), a wheelwright. Lovejoy built his house in stages, possibly starting with a shop that doubled as a suitable bachelor pad, completing the house a year or so after his marriage in June 1854, judging by the increasing assessed value of his buildings. This left Rachel still owning the 10 Cross Street lot. We'll get back to that.

## 117 Boston Post Road

1846-1852: In March 1846, Rachel Batchelder bought the brick house at 117 Boston Post Road, built by Timothy Danforth in 1824, for \$1200 from Charles L. Stewart of New York City, formerly of Amherst, an investment

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
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
