Historic Amherst

Recommended Historic and **Historical Reading**

A new school year has begun. The kiddos are $back\ in\ class,\ no\ doubt\ learning\ valuable\ things$ and busy with homework. So I thought this would be a good time to offer you, local history enthusiast, some extra-credit assignments. Here are some publications that I have enjoyed and found eye-opening regarding local conditions in the 19th century.

The Life and Adventures of Seth Wyman: Embodying the Principal Events of a Life Spent in Robbery, Theft, Gambling, Passing Counterfeit Money, &c., &c. "written by himself," published posthumously 1843 by J. H. Cate, printer of Manchester, N.H., 310 pages (online books. google.com). The author was Seth Wyman ("Jr.", actually the 5th, 1784-1843) of Goffstown, whose criminal escapades in shoplifting, burglary, passing counterfeit bills, and seduction, took him to Boston and Maine – and Amherst, N.H. He made his first visit to Amherst to get some deeds registered on behalf of his father (1808), and took the opportunity to shoplift cloth from "Col. M.'s" store (which we know was Col. Means at 1 Pierce Lane); and later several more visits to Amherst were hosted by the county "gaol." (I recounted how adultery first landed him in Amherst's jail in my 9 Sep. '14 column.) This book includes the best info I've found on the interior layout of Amherst's stone jail. Other commentators have suggested that he must have been exaggerating - but significant details can be verified by historic sources. (He neglects to mention that, as a result of his imprisonment in Charlestown, Mass. in 1818, his wife and six children were domiciled at the Boston almshouse and while he occupied the state prison in Concord, N.H., from 1820-1823, his wife and children resided in the County poor house.) Seth was clearly a born raconteur and this is a rollicking fun read.

Excelsior: Journals of the Hutchinson Family Singers, 1842-1846. Edited and annotated by Dale Cockrell. Sociology of Music Series no. 5, 1989, Pendragon Press, Stuyvesant, N.Y. The most popular entertainers of the mid-19 th century were a young quartet of singers from Milford, N.N., whose grandfather Andrew Leavitt resided in Amherst. These journals document how they got started in

their singing careers, as Abby turned 13, traveling from place to place in horse-drawn wagon and staying at inns, arranging concerts as they went, in New Hampshire and New York and Philadelphia and, by train, Baltimore. In Feb. 1844, they visited President Tyler's house in Washington, D.C., and sang for those gathered there. Their public concert in that city was attended by both Senators for N.H., Levi Woodbury and C. G. Atherton (born in Amherst) and they visited with Daniel Webster (1782-1852). From the excellent historical annotations, you can learn all sorts of interesting tidbits – such as the cost of feeding your horse at taverns, pedlars and hawkers in NYC, the bill of fare and cost of various dishes offered by a restaurant in Philadelphia, the musical competition. This book is rather hard to come by – the Milford library has several copies but you may have to find a comfy spot there to read it. (See this column, 25 March 2014, for the singers ties to Amherst.)

"Civil War Diary of Newton Timothy Hartshorn" [(1842-1922)], Feb.-June 1862 (transcription with drawings online ancestrallychallenged.com/nhamherst/NTHdiary.htm hyphens) by Derek S. Hartshorn, the diarist's greatgrandson, 2008, who also entered autobiographical details in findagrave.com, South Sandisfield Cemetery, Mass.). The diarist was

born in Amherst, N.H. In Oct. 1861 he joined

the U.S. Engineer Corps, so one gets a different perspective of the war than that of an infantry soldier. He went on to become a Boston artist, especially of crayon portraits, best known for painting a portrait of President U. S. Grant.

Our Nig, or, Sketches from the Life of a Free Black was printed in 1859 in Boston, Mass.; the copyright was filed in District Court of Massachusetts by "H. E. Wilson" and therefore authorship is attributed to Harriet/Hattie E. (Adams) Wilson (1825/7-1900), who was born a free person of color in Milford, N.H., daughter of a poor white woman and a free black man. Although Prof. Gates, who rediscovered and republished the book in 1983, called it a novel, scholarship immediately focused on verifying autobiographical details. I would classify this as a memoir, that genre that purports to be non-fiction but tends to stray into fiction for the sake of the narrative (in this case also changing all the people's names). The introduction to Penguin's 2005 edition by P. Gabrielle Foreman, associate professor of English & American Studies at Occidental College, and Reginald H. Pitts, historical researcher and genealogist, provides details of the author's life. Besides what the story itself reveals about blacks in this area in the 19th century, the pro-


