## The Health Insurance Marketplace

AMHERST – Health Insurance Marketplace Information and Open Enrollment Assistance at the Amherst Town Library is being provided through a certified Marketplace Assister from the Servicelink Resource Center for Hillsborough County.

The sessions are scheduled for Tuesdays, beginning November 11, and continuing through Tuesday, February 10 from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. in the Archives Room of the Amherst Town Library. These sessions will begin with a formal presentation from 4:00 to 4:30 p.m. by Bokyoung Mun, a certified Marketplace Assister, and follow up with a Q & A session from 4:30 to 6:00 p.m. If you are planning to attend the formal educational session, please register. During the Q & A time, "drop-ins" are welcome. Bokyoung holds a Bachelor's de-

gree in Health Care Management and a Master's degree in Business Administration with a Certificate in Health Care Administration from Plymouth State University. During these scheduled sessions Bokyoung will assist people in completing and submitting an eligibility application for health coverage; assist people with enrollment; review eligibility determinations for enrollment in health coverage; educate people about eligibility and enrollment through the Marketplace; and, assist consumers in applying for exemptions or appeals.

She would go on to perform around the world for another 58 years.

Nanette Perrotte tells Ella's extraordinary story of traveling from being homeless in Harlem to the Queen of Swing. Along the way she had great mentors: Chuck Webb, Duke Ellington, Marilyn Monroe, Dizzy Gillespie, Louis Armstrong, and Frank Sinatra. Then there is the Battle of the Bands—the Cutting Contest at the Savoy Ballroom where she wins the battle over Billie Holiday. All of this is played out in the context of the Harlem Renaissance, the Great Depression, Segregation, and World War II: the critical years, 1935-1955. Through singing her signature songs and telling her story, this presentation illuminates the Social History of that time. The Man I Love, It Don't Mean a Thing, It's Only a Paper Moon and Azure among others. The multimedia presentation allows Perrotte to combine her sing-

ing, storytelling, and teaching tal-

ents to showcase Ella Fitzgerald's masterful work and complex life

Born to an Ecuadorian mother and a French father, Perrotte was raised in Amsterdam, Holland and Orlando, Florida before attending Boston's Berklee College of Music where she received her BA in Jazz Composition and Arranging with a principal instrument of Voice. This course of study was the fulfillment of a childhood spent singing and performing that continues on as a professional vocalist. Perrotte's Master's Degree in Education from Lesley University in Cambridge, MA focused her work on Arts as a tool to learn and experience cultural diversity. With her college teaching career, private coaching and voice students, college choir and acting/improve troupe, Perrotte has now evolved a new lecture/presentation form that combines social history, musicology, and storytelling in her program on Ella Fitzgerald.

Perrotte will also be performing in our Children's Room at 4 p.m. on the same day, Tuesday, February 3, to the younger set (ages 4 and up) in a specially created program on Ella

for their age group.
