AARP Tax Aide

Free Tax help will be available at the Wadleigh Library from February 3rd to April 14th. The hours will be the same each week:

- Tuesdays - 9:30am to 2:00pm
- Thursdays - 3:30pm-6:30pm

Appointments are not required. The Wadleigh Library is an official Tax Form Repository. We will provide forms as we receive them from the federal and state government.

Since 1968, AARP Tax-Aide volunteers have helped nearly 50 million low- to middle-income taxpayers, many of whom are aged 60 or older. Tax-Aide volunteers (IRS Certified) are trained to assist with filing the 1040 Form and the more standard of the schedules, including Schedules A and B. Electronic filing (e-filing) is offered at the Wadleigh Memorial Library site, with no charge to the taxpayer. E-filing ensures more accurate tax returns and faster processing of tax refunds.

MILFORD -- This past fall, after an 18-month nationwide search process, the leadership team, at Church of Our Saviour called then interim rector, the Rev. Hays (Hank) Junkin, to serve as permanent full-time rector of the Milford-based parish.

On Wednesday, January 21, the parish will join with the Right Reverend A. Robert Hirschfeld, the bishop of the Episcopal Church of New Hampshire, clergy from throughout the diocese, as well as local clergy and community leaders in celebrating their new ministry together.

The event, which commences at 6:30 p.m. at the Amherst Street church building, marks an important milestone in the life of the local parish. It recognizes not only the calling of Fr. Hank, but of the parish's commitment to continuing the shared work of Christ through both its ordained and lay members.

Members of the local community are welcome to attend.

Fr. Hank, who has served as interim rector at Church of Our Saviour for the past three years, is a strong supporter of outreach programs. He believes pastoral care is the heartbeat of parish life and brings more than 36 years of experience in parish ministry to his new role.
