Every Man's Wish On Board: The Art Of The Harlem **Renaissance – Final Program in The Series**

AMHERST – In the final program of the Amherst Town Library's series for adults entitled, Hail to the Harlem Renaissance, Scholar Nancy Baker presents, "Every Man's Wish on Board: The Art of the Harlem Renaissance" on Tuesday, February 24 at 7 p.m. This program will look at the Harlem Renaissance in the context of the history of Afro-American art in the United States and explore the work of the major artists of the Harlem Renaissance, focusing particularly on those whose works are on display in nearby museums like the Currier Museum of Art in Manchester, the MFA in Boston, and the Worcester Museum of Art in Worcester, MA.

Few cultural movements were as well integrated as the Harlem Renaissance of the 1920s and 1930s. Author Zora Neale Hurston said that "Ships at a distance have every man's wish on board." This idea of a shared cultural and social identity is what energized the work of artists Charles Alston, Romare Bearden, Aaron Douglas, Jacob Lawrence, and others. They created powerful and stylish images of energy and identity that helped shape a new modernism in American art.

Presenter Nancy Baker was one of the Founding Faculty at Souhegan High School. Recently retired, during her time at the school, Nancy taught Mythology, History of Ideas, Philosophy, Ancient History, and Latin. Nancy has been involved as a volunteer at the Currier



Miss Anne In Harlem: The White Women Of The Black Renaissance



AMHERST – The Amherst Town Library welcomes Dr. Carla Kaplan, bestselling author and Northeastern University Professor, for the presentation, "Miss Anne in Harlem: The White Women of the Black Renaissance," on Thursday, February 19 at 7:00 p.m. as part of the Library's series for adults entitled, Hail to the Harlem Renais-

the epicenter. White men could go uptown to see jazz and modern dance, but women who embraced black culture too enthusiastically could be ostracized. Miss Anne in Harlem focuses on six of the unconventional, free-thinking women some from Manhattan high society, many Jewish, who crossed race lines and defied social conventions to become a part of the culture and heartbeat of Harlem. Dr. Kaplan's formidable work remaps the land-scape of the 1920s, alters our perception of this historical moment, and brings Miss Anne to vivid life.

Presenter Carla Kaplan is the Davis Distinguished Professor of American Literature at Northeastern University, where, as the Founding Director of the University's Humanities Center, she created a conversational hub dedicated to diversity. She has held positions at Yale University, the University of Southern California, and the University of Illinois. Additionally, she teaches writing through arts councils and writers' centers. She is also the author of Zora Neal Hurston: A Life in Letters and The Erotics of Talk: Women's Writing and Feminist Paradigms. Kaplan's book, Zora Neale Hurston: A Life in Letters was a finalist for the NAACP Image Award, a New York Times Notable Book, a New York magazine "top five" book of the season, a Book-of-the-Month Club pick, and the subject of feature articles in the Washington Post, The Los Angeles Times, and the New York Times. Her most recent book, Miss Anne of Harlem: The White Women of the Black Renaissance draws upon Kaplan's thirty years as a white scholar in Black Studies to explore cultural crossovers. There will be a book signing following the presentation.

til the 1920s, as a group of writers, primarily based in New York City, gave voice to the ideals and aspirations of a new generation. Poets such as Langston Hughes, Jean Toomer, and many others changed the literary landscape. They wrote about the past, but were not bound to it. They hoped in the future, but were very mindful of the present. Together, these poets and many others, captured the spirit of their times and helped shape African American identity. Their work is essential to understanding the Harlem Renaissance.

Presenter Dr. Keith Williams teaches nineteenth and twentieth century African American Literature and American Literature at Saint Anselm College. In addition to general survey courses in these areas, he teaches specialized topics on such areas as the U.S. Civil War and the Harlem Renaissance. Dr. Williams's primary research interest is in slave narratives and neo-slavery texts. He has published on topics ranging from Othello to Charles Chesnutt, and presented at numerous conferences. Dr. Williams came to Saint Anselm in 2007. At Saint Anselm, he is Director of the Honors Program along with being a faculty co-advisor to the Black Student Coalition, and the literary magazine, Quatrain. He also serves on the delegate assembly, the elective body of the Modern Language Association. He holds a Ph.D. from Cornell University.

AMHERST – The Friends of the Amherst Town Library would like to welcome Elaine Farmer and her wonderful oil paintings to exhibit at the Amherst Town Library during the month of March. The exhibit will be on the main floor of the library from March 2 to March 31. Join Elaine at her reception and book signing event on March 15, 2-4pm at the Amherst Town Library, 14 Main St., Amherst, NH. She will share more about her fascinating approach to painting and her published book titled "HARMO-NIOUS COLOR SCHEMES; a no nonsense approach using the Color Wheel".

Elaine is a resident and creates from her art studio in Amherst, NH. In addition to being a full time artist, she provides art instruction and workshops out of her studio. Elaine has always had a deep connection to the natural world around her and enjoys taking part in translating natures' magnificence to canvas. Landscapes have always been her passion, where shapes, textures and lighting always offer an endless source of subjects and challenges. She paints outdoors (en plein air) as often as possible and uses these quick sketches as reference for larger, Studio pieces.

Elaine was born into a family of musicians and grew up in Massachusetts with seven siblings, all with various artistic talents of their own. She began her own artistic journey at the age of 12 with her first set of oil paints and has been studying and painting art ever since. She has studied art through classes and workshops with many well known artists in the U.S. and internationally. Traveling the world to find new ideas, her current body of work focuses on quiet landscapes as seen near home and far beyond. Using a simple design structure and brighter than life colors, she blends traditional realism with a contemporary impressionistic feeling, capturing the essence of her inspiration.

Through her teaching experiences, her students led her to focus on developing an easy to understand color mixing method for use by working artists, teachers and the novice painter. The result was an e-book published in September 2013 titled "HARMONIOUS COL-OR SCHEMES; a no nonsense approach using the Color Wheel". Elaine uses this approach when painting her own artwork. "I love the simplicity of using a harmonious color schemes when I paint. It takes the guess work out of the process, allowing me to stay in the mo-ment when I paint".
