Unfunded Mandates Impact Amherst School District Budget

To the editor:

Mindful of all Amherst taxpayers' desire to see ongoing cuts that reflect declining enrollment, we have presented a decreasing budget to the voters over the past two years. As we have attempted every year, we are pleased to have cut costs once again. In fact, the cuts exceed \$700,000 in expenditures in the current budget proposal. Despite these cuts, our budget is up

The FY16 Amherst School District budget drivers include over \$1,000,000 in under-funded state and federal mandates in Special Education costs, increases in NH Retirement, and contractual obligations. Despite over a million dollars in increases, we've controlled the budget increase to \$306,000 due to a decrease of \$700K in spending.

Last year, we received unanticipated money from our insurance provider

along with more tuition from Mont Vernon than was expected. This resulted in an unreserved fund balance of over \$900,000 (a revenue anomaly) which was returned to the taxpayers this past fall. Because we didn't receive this again, it translates into a revenue loss of over \$400,000 this year thus causing an increase in the Amherst School District portion of the tax

In FY16, we will continue to examine ways to lower costs while providing an exceptional education to all of our students within the Amherst School

Support SHS Budget and Maintain The Excellent Work Being Done

Voting day is March 10th, and we encourage all voters to come to the polls and exercise their right (and duty) to local control of their school systems. On Tuesday, Amherst voters will vote in the Souhegan High School Gym between 6AM and 8PM. Mont Vernon voters will vote at the Village School between 7AM and 7PM.

For the Souhegan school district, there are many decisions to be made. A single board seat will be filled for the next three years with a candidate from Amherst. The budget for the next school year will be decided. Voters will decide if the failing track will be replaced, and if the maintenance trust

Souhegan is a great high school, where the mission of educating all our towns' children is taken seriously, and "No Child Left Behind" is not just a slogan, but a priority. A High School education is not just reading, 'riting, and 'rithmatic, but extends beyond academics to prepare students to be active citizens, good team players in a world where collaboration and cooperation are key to economic success, and compassionate stewards of the society they are joining. From the classroom to the athletic fields to the after-school activities to the community they serve, our students learn and are prepared for life in college, work, and society.

Here are some of the achievements from the past year that highlight the success we have enabled for our students, and the work of our staff to sup-

- 92% percent of Souhegan's Class of 2014 attend college
- 86% attend four year, 6% attend two year; 5% entered the work force; 3% went on to other activities (prep school, service organization, mili-
- The majority of four year college students are attending either most competitive, highly competitive, very competitive or competitive col-
- Souhegan has a 99% graduation rate.
- In 2014, Souhegan Students took AP exams in 14 different subjects. 85% of students who took AP exams scored a 3 (qualified to receive college credit), 4 (well qualified to receive college credit) or 5 (extremely well qualified to receive college credit). (NH State average is 74%, and the national average 60%.)
- 88% percent of Souhegan seniors took the SATs in 2013-2014
- 107 seniors received New Hampshire Scholars recognition in 2014.
- 2 seniors are commended in the National Merit Scholarship Competi-

- Souhegan students had the opportunity to study in Italy, Cuba, Germany, and France through programs organized by Souhegan Staff.
- Souhegan athletic department supports 34 programs including 53

Teacher Dave Saxe was recognized by the National Soccer Coaches of Association of America as NH Large School Coach of the Year, and Region I (New England) Coach of the Year

Teacher Kelli Warecki was recognized as Division II Coach of the Year, and selected to coach the Twin State Games between VT and NH

Souhegan High School is consistently accessed by educators from throughout the region and country as a model for best practices; recent visitors have observed our team teaching structures, advisory program and Critical Friends Groups.

Souhegan works in conjunction with Brown University to host teachers from China visiting to examine best practice.

- This year our teaching and learning has been enhanced by our involvement in a groundbreaking initiative. The New Hampshire Department of Education has partnered with the Center for Collaborative Education and the National Center for the Improvement of Educational Assessment to develop a state-wide performance assessment system that will balance local control with state-wide accountability and comparability. Souhegan High School is one of four districts in New Hampshire implementing the Performance Assessment for Competency Education (PACE) option.
- Souhegan is a School Reform Initiative (SRI) best practice site; SRI uses Souhegan High School for site visits to observe best practices.
- Souhegan Business Partnership Board includes representatives from Souhegan High School staff, local professional communities and alumni organized to promote extended learning opportunities, job shadowing, internships and mentor programs.
