Historic Amherst

Caring for Parents in Old Age On Amherst Farms at Beginning of 19th Century

At the turn of the 18th to 19th century, one way that yeomen planned for their survival and comfort in old age was for the (usually elderly) father to convey his farm or half of the farm – to a particular grown-up son, in exchange for continued care for himself & wife in the family home for the rest of their natural lives and a decent burial at their decease, as well as the promise that the son would carry on the farm in a good husbandlike manner. Some of these agreements were quite brief and to the point. But other, less trusting deals spelled out the conditions in greater detail. Some specifications as to what the son was to provide acres) to 1832 (63 acres). for the parents are so exacting

that they are of historical value for what they reveal about productivity of local agriculture. Such agreements are called life leases and they are found in the registry of deeds in the form of a mortgage with the tell-tale words "provided nevertheless if ..." The foreclosure in such cases would be that if the son failed to fulfill the conditions satisfactorily, he would have to pay full value of the real estate or pa (or the heirs) could reclaim ownership of the farm. (Such deals meant that none of the other children would inherit the farm.) Here are two examples in Amherst.

Shannon Farm Near Baboosic Lake

Andrew Shannon, a weaver who came from Reading, Mass., resided on his farm by the south end of Baboosic Lake from about 1761 to 1802 – except when off fighting in the Revolutionary War. Four children were born to him & wife Phebe in Amherst, including William born in June 1767. If Andrew did indeed die in April 1817 at age 89 (Secomb, p. 193), that would have made him 61 years old in June 1799 when he "sold" his 100-acre farm in Amherst, N.H. to [his son] William for \$1000, however "reserving to myself and my wife during the period of our natural lives the house we now live in & convenient privileges round the same & also a small piece of

ground now inclosed the southerly side of the road opposite my house for a garden" (deed 49:59), in exchange for life lease for Andrew & wife Lydia for same amount (mortgage 49:288). The conditions were that William would: pay \$100 to such creditors as Andrew shall choose and at such periods he shall mention; well & faithfully husband the farm and bring Andrew & wife during both their natural lives half of all the corn & grains, fit for use, into Andrew's house, as well as half of all the cider, winter apples & sauce of all kinds into Andrew's cellar, and half the flax, dressed & fit for use; keep winter and summer on the farm 2 cows and 6 sheep for sole use of pa & wife; cut firewood sufficient for summer & winter and haul to door of pa & wife, and further, if thereto required by either, cut the wood fit for the fire; furnish pa & wife with horse, when there was one on the farm, to ride when they had occasion; furnish pa & wife with doctoring & nursing, in case of sickness, & with any necessaries they may stand in need of from time to time; pay half the rates [taxes] of the farm from year to year; and afford Andrew & Lydia a decent burial at

In an unusual move, the son borrowed (in form of mortgage) the full \$1K against the Amherst farm from the Town of Wilton

merely six months later. Well, from there things got messy. Somehow, the father ended up with the land again, borrowing \$500 from Mr. Money-bags himself, Robert Means, Esquire in April 1800 on 100+ acres. The April 1801 tax invoice shows Andrew (not William) residing in Amherst (poll tax) with agricultural land of half acre orcharding, 2 acres mowing, 1 acre tillage, 4 acres pasturing and his taxable livestock being 1 cow and 1 2-year-old neat stock, and wild land & buildings valued \$60. In April 1802, Andrew sold "all my homestead farm" in Amherst for \$1000 to someone from Lyndeborough, in a kind of swap deal.

Joseph Nichols Farm Near **Bedford Line**

One Joseph Nichols came to Amherst from Litchfield in 1805 and bought a farm, bounded northerly in part by Pulpit Run brook, with house whose present address is 106 Horace Greeley Road (although it faces the abandoned Old Joppa Hill Road leading to Bedford) for \$800 (deed 72:383). In December 1807, Joseph executed his first life lease, whereby his son John Nichols, who had just recently reached his majority, got the 100-acre farm (with nominal value of \$1000) in exchange for: carrying on faithful and prudent cultivation of the farm and giving half of the farm's produce to his pa & wife Polly (specifically, half of the cider, apples for common use and for winter, flax dressed fit for use, corn, grains, and sauce of all kinds, all of which was to be delivered to Joseph at his dwelling house on the premises in due season annually); providing & keeping 1 cow & 4 sheep for them but also keeping an additional cow & 2 sheep provided by pa; furnishing firewood; letting Joseph & Polly retain full use of the house; and paying off pa's debts. And further, the son was required to: allow his pa & wife the use & improvement of about half an acre of land in front of the house on easterly side of highway as also a
