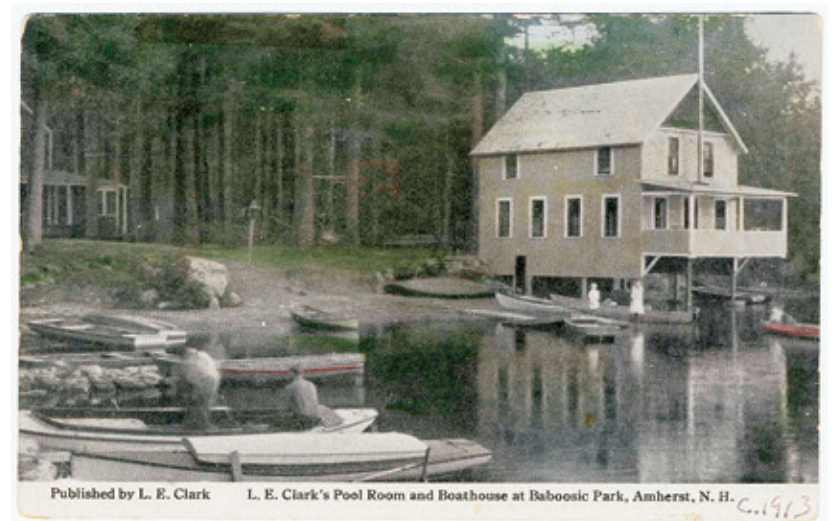
Adult & Youth Horseback Riding Lessons

Baboosic Lake's summer-only Post Office and Jim's Place store. James Henry Atkinson (1870-1940) was seasonal-store proprietor and postmaster from 1924 until his death. Notice gas pump by car.

Moonbeam dance hall at Baboosic Lake, c. 1935. Originally built 1903 by Louis E. Clark, it was rebuilt in 1931, after collapse of snow-laden roof, by Harold C. Gault, who owned Moonbeam and store next door 1926 to 1936.

house ca. 1971; enlarged and reoriented in 1988; still standing at 63 Broadway. (Deed covenants prohibit any kind of retail business, including store and restaurant.)

1904: Baboosic Lake Association of cottage owners formed, initially for off-season fellowship, and held their first couple annual meetings in winter in Nashua.

1910: Cottage subdivision on lowest part of western shore began with Colston selling off small lots, with deed restrictions prohibiting public business and sale of intoxicating liquors on premises.

1912: New road built at Baboosic Lake "from Wm. Colston's to Clark's Grove," for which the Town bought a lot of land (in part with cash donation from Colston) so road would be straight and on waterfront, and L. E. Clark donated a lakefront parcel 11 feet wide and 100 feet long. "This road ... giv[es] the people at the lake a road where they can get their mail better and will be a great convenience getting from one grove to the other," wrote the Selectmen.

1914: First bowling alleys (3) opened in June by Italian-born Louis Aimini (1880-1954) of Milford, later Wilton, in purpose-built building on Milford Street at Baboosic Lake "on the line between Colston's and Clark's groves," erected & installed by Wm Hickey and Charles Fairchild of Wilton. Aimini also offered cigars, tobacco and soft drinks, and in July purchased John Gilson's lunch wagon and moved it near his bowling alleys. From 1921 to 1938, these bowling alleys (on half acre lot) were owned & operated by Mrs. Angeline M. Ryan (1872-1944), who also owned & managed several summer rental cottages. In 1938, the Amherst Tax Collector took her bowling property for back taxes; now Town-owned empty lot at 16 Milford Street.

1914: Pool hall opened by L. E. Clark in purpose-built (by C. F. Wright of Nashua) cottage as combination boathouse, built over the water so one could step directly onto a boat. For summer 1915, John Duval of Amherst was in charge of the poolroom, while he & family spent the summer in a cottage. In 1921 & 1922, J. H. Atkinson managed poolroom.

1915: Cruises around lake in large motor boat seating 20 passengers offered by C. S. Nichols, proprietor of hotel & Point of Pines grove since the year prior. In July 1918, Nichols launched 28-foot motor boat to make regular trips around the lake.

1921: Camp Wakanahit of Manchester Y.W.C.A. (founded 1920) opened on shore for girls and women aged 14-40, costing Girl Reserves \$7 per week, others from Manchester & Nashua \$8, and "out of town" girls \$9, or a daily rate of \$1.50. (From 1920-1943, at their 244 Boston Post Road home about 1 mile south of the Village, Ernest & Daisy Kirby operated a summer camp for poor Boston boys, Camp Collyer, which in July 1924 hosted over 100 boys.)

1924: Summer post office opened at Baboosic Lake, postmaster being James H. Atkinson (1870-1940) until his death, a life-long Amherst resident, who was also the (part-time) police chief in 1920s and game warden. He resided on his 35a farm on Baboosic Lake road. This P.O. closed 1941.

mid-1920s: Geneva Lodge, built by Willard Parker & Miss Annie Parker on sliver of eastern shore that is part of Amherst, opened with 19 bedrooms, each with electricity and running water. Guests enjoyed whist parties and tennis tournaments and put on their own in-house musicales.

1927: Camp development on eastern shore, Pine-Knol-Lah, on which the only commercial enterprises allowed were filling station and provision store.

1935: Five slot machines at Baboosic Lake raided and confiscated by sheriffs, for which Herbert Wenzel ("Sr.") and Donald Shedd, who both pleaded nolo to charge of maintaining gambling device, were given suspended jail sentence of 30

days on payment of the cost of court or \$17.50 each.

1936: Second bowling alleys (2) installed by G. F. Wenzel (licenses in '36 & '37) in Moonbeam which Gustav bought in 1936 and sold to son Herbert in 1940, thus bringing both pavilions under same ownership & management.

1937 ca.: Rollerskating rink in Moonbeam, open several days a week, from around 1937 to 1947.

1941: Camp Young Judea for Jewish boys and girls built on shore with mess hall and ten cabins.

1971: Town bought 5.5 acres with Pine-Echo Pavilion and its beach, which had been created and extended to the Point by Herb Wenzel "Jr." with imported (from Milford) sand, for \$75K. Voters approved 218

to 144 (out of more than 2400 registered voters) at special Town meeting Sep. '71.
